Overview: Cannabis Events

- Cannabis sales and consumption by adults (21+) are allowed at licensed cannabis events.
- California is the only state that currently allows cannabis events which include adults sales and consumption.
- In California, cannabis events and the people / companies who organize them are licensed by the Bureau of Cannabis Control (BCC).
- Cannabis event licensing is new as of 2018, when the first set of BCC Emergency Regulations went into effect.

Cannabis Events: Governing Laws & Regulations

- Not mentioned in MAUCRSA statutes.
- Licensed by the Bureau of Cannabis Control.
- Codified in the BCC's regulations at 16 C.C.R. §§ 5600 et seq.
 - Regulations address event sales, consumption, security, etc.
 - New for final regulations: Educational / Informational Cannabis Events

Cannabis Event Locations

- Originally, cannabis events could only take place at a state fairground or a district agricultural association. However, in 2018, <u>Assembly Bill 2020</u> was passed, which resulted in licensed cannabis events being allowed at any venue that has been approved by a local jurisdiction. It became effective on January 1, 2019.
- Amended Section 26200 of the Business and Professions Code, which now reads in part:

"...This division does not prohibit the issuance of a state temporary event license to a licensee authorizing onsite cannabis sales to, and consumption by, persons 21 years of age or older at a county fair event, district agricultural association event, or at another venue expressly approved by a local jurisdiction for the purpose of holding temporary events of this nature, provided that the activities, at a minimum, comply with all the following..."

"...A state temporary event license shall only be issued in local jurisdictions that authorize such events..."

Cannabis Event Organizers v. Temporary Cannabis Events

- A cannabis Event Organizer license is required in order to host Temporary Cannabis Events.
- A separate Temporary Cannabis Event license is required for each event, and each event may last for no more than 4 consecutive days.
- Only licensed retailers (or licensed microbusinesses authorized to conduct retail sales) can sell cannabis goods at licensed cannabis events. Their BCC license must be prominently displayed.
- Alcohol and tobacco may not be sold or consumed on the premises of a temporary cannabis event.

Cannabis Events Sales

- Only licensed retailers (or microbusinesses with a retail component) may sell cannabis goods at a licensed cannabis event. Delivery-only retailers may conduct sales at temporary cannabis events. Each retailer will be assigned a designated area to conduct their sales in.
- All cannabis goods must be transported to the event by one or more licensed distributors.
- The cannabis event organizer is responsible for checking all shipments brought in to the event to prevent prohibited items (such as alcohol, tobacco or weapons).
- Daily sales limits still apply.

Cannabis Events Sales (continued)

- Cannabis goods must be stored in locked containers and can't be left unattended.
- Taxes still apply, and all transactions must be entered into the track-and-trace system.
- Packaging and labeling requirements still apply.
- Retailers must verify the age of a customer before selling to them.
- Event organizer is responsible for making sure all the licensees there follow the rules (big responsibility).

Consumption at Cannabis Events

- Nobody under the age of 21 can enter the consumption area.
- The consumption area must be designated on the diagram that is submitted to the BCC, and must be screened from the public's view or any non-age-restricted areas.
- Consumption of alcohol or tobacco is not allowed on the event premises.
- Smoking cannabis is not allowed anywhere where smoking is prohibited by law.
- The event organizer is responsible for making sure that all rules regarding onsite consumption of cannabis goods are followed.

Local Control over Cannabis Events

- As mentioned, cannabis events can only take place at locations where local approval has been granted.
- Currently, only a handful of jurisdictions across the state explicitly allow or prohibit cannabis events, while the vast majority have not yet addressed this emerging topic.
- Examples of jurisdictions allowing cannabis events:
 - City of Santa Rosa
 - City of Cloverdale
- Examples of jurisdictions prohibiting cannabis events:
 - Sonoma County

Special Concerns for Cannabis Events

- Proximity to schools and other sensitive uses
- Ensuring only adults 21+ enter gain access
- Blocking the public's view of the sales and consumption areas
- Tracking and tax collection
- Ensuring proper quality control
- Obeying smoking ordinances
- Prohibiting the sale and consumption of alcohol and tobacco on the premises
- Finding a local jurisdiction willing to allow cannabis events

Application Process: Cannabis Event Organizer

- Online or paper applications available from <u>www.bcc.ca.gov</u>
- Fees
 - Application Fees:
 - ▶ \$1,000
 - ► License Fees:
 - 0-5 events annually \$3,000
 - ► 6-10 events annually \$5,000
 - 11-20 events annually \$9,000
 - 20+ events annually \$20,000

Application Process: Temporary Cannabis Event

- Online or paper application available from <u>www.bcc.ca.gov</u>
- Fees
 - Application Fee:
 - ▶ \$1,000
 - ► License Fees:
 - N/A (only an application fee for the event itself)

Cannabis Event Licenses by the Numbers* * As of 1/7/19

- Event Organizers:
 - Approximately 100 licensed event organizers as of 1/7/19
- Temporary Cannabis Events:
 - Not listed online, but there have been a handful so far, including the Emerald Cup, the High Times Cannabis Cup, and Local Sesh.

On-Site Consumption: Governing Laws

- Included in MAUCRSA at Business & Professions Code §26200(g):
 - "Notwithstanding paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) of Section 11362.3 of the Health and Safety Code, a local jurisdiction may allow for the smoking, vaporizing, and ingesting of cannabis or cannabis products on the premises of a retailer or microbusiness licensed under this division if all of the following are met:
 - (1) Access to the area where cannabis consumption is allowed is restricted to persons 21 years of age or older.
 - (2) Cannabis consumption is not visible from any public place or nonage-restricted area.
 - (3) Sale or consumption of alcohol or tobacco is not allowed on the premises."

On-Site Consumption: Governing Regulations

Discussed in the BCC regulations at 16 C.C.R. §5025(f):

"Cannabis shall not be dispersed in the air throughout the premises or throughout a portion of the premises by an oil diffuser or any other vaporizing device that is intended to disperse the vapor throughout the premises or throughout a portion of the premises. This section shall not be interpreted to prohibit cannabis consumption on the premises of a licensed retailer or licensed microbusiness authorized to engage in retail sales that is conducted in accordance with Business and Professions Code section 26200(g)."
